
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This story was read together in class this week.

The class went outside for recess. Mei Lee (MAY-lee) and Paul raced for the swings. They liked to see who could swing the highest.


Mei Lee thought about the big project. She said, "I think we should write a song or put on a play for our class project. What do you think?"

"What about the outside wall we see when we swing on the playground?" said Paul. "All the classes see it every day!"


